- If a book or other material does not have an author, use the title or shortened form of the title in place of the author's last name. One-page articles and encyclopedia articles do not need page numbers.

GENERAL TIPS

- **Entries are in alphabetical order.**
- The first line of each entry begins at the left margin. The second line (if needed) is indented five spaces.
- Single-space within an entry. Double space between entries..
- If you use a source not listed here, consult the *MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers* (Ref 808.02 Gi) or ask a librarian for assistance.
- If you cannot find a date, use the abbreviation n.d. (no date). If you cannot find a page, use n.p. (no page).
- Do not label the entries with the type of source (e.g. Magazine).
- The following is an example of what a completed bibliography should look like:
